Wildlife Issues 2026 by David McCord, Wildlife Director

For their help with our booth at the Gun Collector Show in Greeley, I want to thank Ron Mann for his heavy lifting in displaying his vast and wonderful collection of muzzle loaders and his care for storing application blanks for Colorado ML clubs, handouts, Muzzle Blasts, tri-folds, shoot event schedules, Poke copies, etc. Also thanks to Lou Garone, Ron Ring, Dale Crabb, Bob Kagohara, Dave ---, and others for their time running our booth. We signed up for the same tables next year.

Sportsman's Day at the Capital was a great success, 300+ people, good wild game BBQ and brats, governor candidates, Representative and Senators, agency officials, and wildlife friends, nice weather, and we muzzle loaders were well

recognized on the billboards and by Dan Gates from the dais. I visited with Miss Rodeo Colorado Lindsey Fancher-Rule and we explained to her about elk ivory, now she wants to marry an elk hunter to collect the ivories. She visited the Capital building but could not go into the chambers due to her regalia – rules do not allow. The fur trappers provided her with a fur stole. Items covered by the CWCP and others.

This is an election-year and many new faces will appear at the next legislature. If you encounter candidates, remind them of the importance of our hunting, fishing, and shooting heritage.

The CWCP is looking at needed legislation. Bill titles are due in 7 months. One expected bill will provide process to donate wild game meat, should mean via USDA processors. Another is to restructure appointments to the CPW Commission. The present commission is fully stacked with Polis people and their shift to animal rights is appalling. Another need is look at restructuring the CPW, maybe split off Parks. Back in time the Parks Division oversaw State Parks and not more, but following the merger, the culture of the CPW Commission shifted toward recreation and social attitude, and we get action such as the fur ban, motion to approve was made by a "parks" position appointee and the 2nd came from a former hunter now apparent anti-hunter in his actions. In past years, parks Commissioners tended to allow the Sports persons and Ag representatives to handle wildlife items, no more.

Formal CWCP letters:
• Sent to Senate Agriculture &

Natural Resources Committee, letter to oppose confirmation of John Emrick and Chris Sichko (it worked, the two withdrew)

- Individual messages sent members of the CPW Commission to oppose petition that would ban sale of fur (we lost). CPW acted to ban fur sales at their March 3 and 4 meeting. Note that no fur bearing animals are at risk or threatened. You can still trap them but can't sell the furs. The rule making is in motion. CPW is open for comments on these rules.
- Support of mitigation impact fees from oil & gas production mandated by SB24-230.
- A thank you letter to Rep Hurd for supporting the federal Wildlife Crossings Grant Program in the Surface Transportation Re authorization bill, the BUILD America 250 Act. He attended the "Circle the Wagons" gathering of sportspeople, county commissioners, and conservation and wildlife supporters the evening before the May CPW Commission meeting in Grand Junction.

Miscellaneous

- Bill to ban 3D printing of gun parts was approved
- Barrel bill is dead.
- Nominees to the CPW Commission, these two withdrew under our pressure and from the Ag community, John Emerick, a very pro wolf advocate, and Chris Sishko who wanted to replace the vacated Sportsmen slot. This leaves two vacancies on the 11-member commission. We do not know names of present candidates in motion, and several Commissioners are term limited ending their time in July. Replacements will be via Gov. Polis nominations, he may respect us or fight us.
- Initiative 302 Constitutional

amendment to add right to hunt and fish. As of Thurs. June 25, 75% of needed signatures done, now, focus is on metro districts where the 2% threshold is needed, these districts had lots of past votes. I recommend signing if you see a petitioner. Well-funded effort from the T. Roosevelt organization, active in other states too. I suggested to

the sponsors the Ft. Lupton shoots would be a great chance but they have not gotten back. Here in the Front Range public events are popular and the King Soopers may have petitioners.

• Our need is to get ahead of the anti-hunting, animal rights radicals. Note IP28 in Oregon that appears to be making their November ballot. Approval would make killing all animals a felony. Fighting IP28 will soak up major funds from hunting and fishing organizations that could be better used for conservation projects.

Wolf issues: no new wolves were introduced this year. Pack wolves stay put in their region. Solo wolves wonder. The wolf inventory shows 18 collared wolves and 14 pups. On June 12, CPW lethally removed an uncollared wolf in Routt County; a preying wolf that had taken out 20 some sheep and would not stop preying on livestock. A member of Copper Creek Pack, but missed when members of the pack were relocated. A collared wolf briefly traveled east of I-25 in Southern Colorado visiting Pueblo, Otero, and Las Animas Counties before crossing back west of I-25.

• Highway wildlife crossings and infrastructure bill, SB 141, approved, provides for a voluntary \$5 donation added to your motor vehicle registration renewal to help fund wildlife crossings.

• SB25 003, August 1, purchase of

semiautomatic magazine-fed firearms will require passing a \$52 safety training course via CPW, application online, show local sheriff government-issued identification, and a passed background check. If approved, the sheriff will enter the individuals' information into a firearms safety system database.

The Department of Revenue has issued a 152 page list, of semi-auto firearms, a wide catalog of semi-autos, includes pistols, but without a search, I can't determine if C&R auto firearms are included, probably. May list .22 rimfire 10-22 – not supposed to, may list shotguns in error as well.

Colorado Lead Ammo Ban Petition Targets Hunters, a petition to the CPW. Thanks to Greg Smith for the following. Sportsmen's Alliance reports that activists have filed a petition with the Colorado Parks and Wildlife Commission seeking to ban the use of traditional lead ammunition for taking wildlife in Colorado. The group says the petition is led by Wayne Pacelle, the former Humane Society of the United States executive who resigned amid sexual harassment allegations, and argues the proposal would make it unlawful to possess lead ammunition and a firearm capable of firing it while taking or attempting to take wildlife.

Next reports: In a future report I will attempt to compile a list of candidates and their general attitude to wildlife and firearms. Also, beaver management noting drought and loss of stream habitat has meant beavers focus

on remaining waters, often damming and plugging irrigation flow.

4H Shooter Going to Nationals

Joselyn Fontius, daughter of Amanda and Jeramie Allee participated in the 2026 4-H National Shooting Sports Championships in Grand Island, Neb.

She placed 19th in the nation for Muzzleloading. There were 77 muzzleloader competitors representing 23 states! It was an awesome opportunity to learn, grow, share knowledge and make lasting connections.

What Could Go Wrong? By the Editor

It was about 1977 as I recall that I ventured out for a week in the mountains hunting mulies with my trusty TC 50 caliber Hawken. Back then my two girls were in elementary school and I and the wife were not averse to taking them out of school for that week of hunting that had become our tradition since 1970.

The fly in the ointment was that a week before opener I had turned myself upside down on a trail bike and broken my left hand and left foot. Both in casts! But that could not be allowed to deter us so off we went. Of course I was limited mobility wise but what the heck, my foot cast was a walker so. We camped where I could conveniently hike (sort of) up a two track road that ran up the side of a ridge from camp with a deep gully on one side.

I was making it my practice to limp up that road in the morning to near the top of the ridge and just keep an eye on the gully side. Over a few days I saw a few deer on the opposite side of the gully but too far for a shot. Plus, they were on the opposite side of that rather

formidable gully.

Then, one morning there they came. A pair of young bucks. A forkie and a 3X3. They were passing just 15 yards below me down the bank. I sighted on the 3 pointer and took the shot. It was perfect. Except that the deer half fell and half scrambled to the bottom of the gully and died next to a beaver pond. Luckily not in the pond.

Getting down to that deer seemed to take forever but I got there and field dressed him and then looked up. Waaaay up to the two track above. There was only one thing to do and that was to start inching my way up the hillside pulling the deer along behind me by the antlers.

About an hour later I was within about a 100 feet from the top and it occurred to me that in the car I had a massive length of rope. For the life of me I can't recall why or where I acquired it but it spawned a brilliant idea! I would get the car, back up the hill and attach the rope to the deer and pull it up the rest of the way.

I, the wife and kids got in the car and I backed up the two track. There was a stout quakie growing right at the edge. I tied the rope to the hitch ball and threw it over a stout limb of the tree and started down the hill to the deer. Instructions to the wife were to pull forward very slowly when I gave the word and I would ride up the hill on the deer then shout for her to stop when we topped out. What could go wrong, eh?

It was actually kind of smooth going as she slowly pulled myself and the deer up the hillside..... until we got to the top. She didn't hear me shout! But she did notice the tree waving wildly about. When she walked back up she found me and the deer hanging from the tree. Luckily the whole tree had taken a lean over the road and once I got down we were actually able to sorta swing the deer into the trunk.

The rest was smooth sailing.

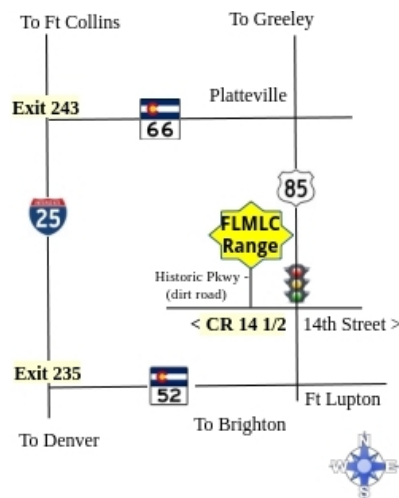

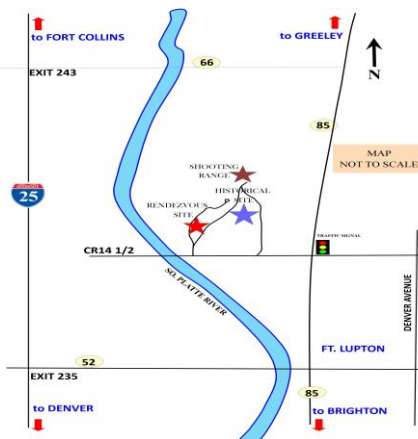

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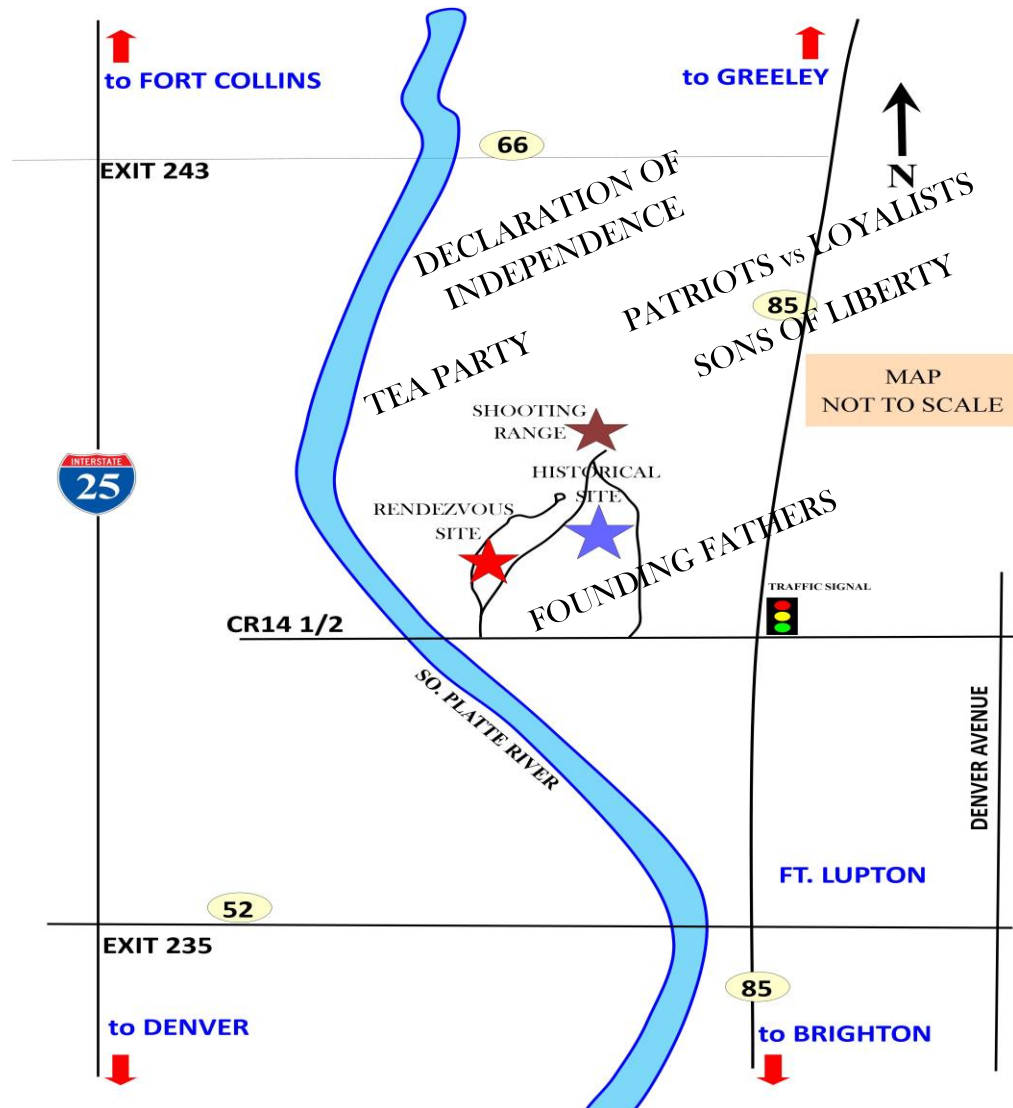
