CSMLA Postal Match

Here are some changes to our CSMLA members postal match. The format is changed in a way that will make the match more accessible to all our members. Here are the entire rules for the postal match including changes which are in **bold**.

What is the entry fee? There is no entry fee. There is no cost to participate. Who can enter? The CSMLA postal is for CSMLA members only. Memberships include all family members including children under age 18 and junior members.

How do I get targets? You can download targets at

What if I don't have access to the internet how can I get targets? **In a pinch, you can contact Ron Mann at 303-257-7239. He will send you a single target which**

you can copy or have copied.

Targets do not have to be mailed in. **Text or email a photo of your target (get close!) to Ron Mann at 303-257-7239** oldbuzzard101@yahoo.com

Targets and photos of targets must be whole. No missing corners or torn off portions.

The match is scored monthly and winners determined annually. **At the end of the year the shooter with the highest single target score for the year will win 2 pounds of powder. The shooter with the second highest single target score for the year will win 1 pound of powder.** Winners will be announced and prizes awarded at the annual Convention and Trade Show in March. Wildlife report
David McCord
Wildlife Director

Comments shared by CWCP members who attended Durango CPW Commission meeting May 8 and 9 earlier this week:

🕒 CPW needs to define how to work with project ideas and regional partnerships

🕒 Recreation interest is growing and our hunting voice is not being heard. Recreation advocates not being fully heard either by the CPW.

🕒 Can't ask the feds – USFS rec work force is down 40%. So leverage project funds? Higher camping fees? Campgrounds not opened? Damaged roads get closed (no repair)?

🕒 Couple fresh CPW commissioners coming. CWCP may be able to comment on. During the just completed legislative session, we, Colorado Wildlife Conservation Project (CWCP), reviewed 24 bills, acted on 8 with letters of comments or sought revisions, and we lost on most gun bills but were able to make minor change in our favor. I added our name to most of the letters but not on the misfire initiative to close wolf introductions.

Semi auto, “high-capacity magazine” ban (SB25-003). Language written in ignorance deleted that would have required that magazines could not be removed. You will need to take and pass a class to purchase semiautos and pass a background. Bill is effective beginning August

1, 2026. And. the same semi auto ban is being introduced nationally by Senator Mark Kelly.

(HB25-1238) gun show bill: DOES NOT APPLY TO US (MUZZLE LOADERS), and DOES NOT APPLY TO C&R FIREARMS. So, at the May 17 and 18 Collector Show in Greeley, you purchase firearm, exchange FFL paper or do background check, and take it home (no 3-day delay; same as with past years. Bill's

directives:

- ⌚ promoter to prepare a security plan and submit the plan to local law enforcement
- ⌚ Have liability insurance
- ⌚ Implement security measures
- ⌚ Under age 18 years must be accompanied by a parent, grandparent, or guardian
- ⌚ Firearm purchaser to verify that each firearm sold is in compliance with 3-day waiting period
- ⌚ Post certain notices
- ⌚ Install cameras to cover gun show spaces and parking lots

Act takes effect January 1, 2026.

Legal challenges for both of these are in motion – contribute to the NRA/ILS, etc.

Ammo purchases “safeguards” (HB25-1133), must be stored behind counter and secured. Same rules may apply to gunpowder(?).

Rep. Boebert and other Republican Colo. Representatives are working on bill that would remove wolves from the endangered species list.

OK, but bill could lead to other species and their habitats being delisted and they then could be at risk. I don't know???

Other Colo bills:

⌚ Habitat bill passed.

⌚ Use highway right-of-ways mandate for adding electric transmission infrastructure, prevents cutting a swath through virgin habitat and impacting wildlife to build a new line.

⌚ Postponed bill that would have used “fees” from each auto insurance policy to fund wild game highway over and under passes and fencing to prevent wildlife-auto collisions. This one should come back next session. The legislators get antsy when fees are considered too close to the session end.

⌚ Procedure to allow an FFL dealer licensee to request a serial number check before purchasing a firearm from an individual. Local county sheriff's offices would have to complete serial number check within three business days of the request.

Intel items from a CWCP member:

1) CPW doesn't currently have a time coding string for wolf management. Meaning no tracking is going on for time spent on wolves. DWMs spending time can't track time AKA salaries being paid out of game cash are not tracked nor will the agency be able to answer the inevitable questions of how this is impacting overall operations that will come from legislators.

2) The Trump administration has put into grants the need for states

to agree to all executive orders in order to get the grants. Currently this is impacting boating safety but I'm sure it will have other impacts. My CI tells me this is being looked at by the AGs office.

A close encounter of the wild kind By Ted Beaupre

Last year we went back to our stomping grounds and believe it or not we pulled into our favorite camping spot. After we set up the camp it started to rain and didn't stop for 3 days, no problem if you hunt out of a fifth wheel trailer. Last year Delores and I both drew muzzle loading deer tags and I ended up with a preference point for elk, so I purchased an over the counter either sex archery elk tag.

September 2nd came, and I headed out at 5 am after reaching the gate I climbed over and headed to my spot about a mile away upon arriving I set up in front of an aspen and settled in waiting for everything to wake up as it grew lighter. The cows started mewing and bulls bugling. Shortly after I sprayed some cow urine around, I heard the elk moving my way standing up. Nocking an arrow, I

stepped around behind the tree and

waited, suddenly I heard the thunder of hooves coming down behind me thinking they were cattle and not wanting to be run over. The gun fit her and she didn't have to fight it. That made it much easier for me to get permission to go shooting. All I had to say was, do you want to go shooting and she'd beat me to the car. Best investment I ever made. When you have to clean a rifle there's no bitching about the mess or the stink. But you do have two rifles to clean. Somehow she could never master the art of cleaning and oiling. Every time I mentioned cleaning rifles she would say, "you'll have to show me how to do that one more time."

It was always so much more fun to have her shooting with me rather than her sitting behind me looking bored. And no more complaints about me being gone

shooting or how much it cost us for me to have fun. And you can get used to her beating you. I did. It actually made me proud. My bride shot well enough to beat me. It actually made me proud of her. She shot well enough to beat me and many many others. Your ego can learn to live with it. Mine did.

So guys, get your girl a rifle. I don't mean that hand me down clunker you started shooting with either. It wasn't good enough for you. You got a better rifle. Why would she be happy shooting that piece of crap. She won't be. She'll quit shooting. Take her shopping. Girls are good at that. She doesn't need a .50 in a one inch barrel. Get a little .36 or .45 for her. And don't forget her arms are shorter than yours. Measure her length of pull and cut the stock down and refit the butt plate to fit her dimensions. If that's beyond your abilities get one of the other guys to help you.

When you get ready to show your girl the wonders of muzzle loading get someone else to teach her the game. Husbands tend to get short and grouchy when trying to show a wife how to do some things. 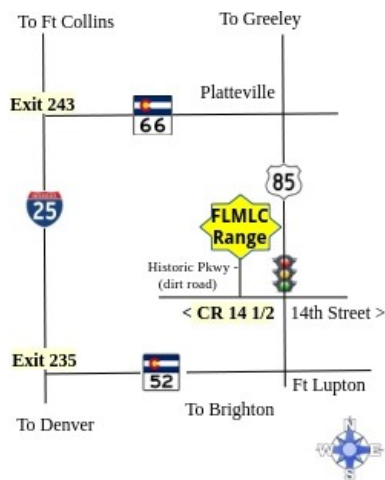

2025 Colorado State Shoot Update

Hello Muzzleloaders! It is that time of the year when we are beginning to think about scheduling and attending the 2025 Colorado State Shoot. So, to that end, here is the latest on the big event.

The shoot will take place on Thursday, August 7th, through Sunday, August 10th, at noon. The stake shoot will follow the shoot at noon, and awards begin at approximately 12:30 pm.

The aggregate events will be the same for 2025 as they were last year. However, there is one exception. At the request of the 4H leadership, we are adding a peep sight aggregate. This is open to Juniors and sub-juniors.

Along the lines of "New," there are two changes to the format.

- Any senior shooter 70 years of age or older may use peep sights in place of the open metal sight requirement.
- Any senior shooter 70 years of age or older may use a two-handed hold for the pistol shoot.

We hope the above rule changes will allow these senior shooters to be more competitive and possibly bring in a few new shooters that otherwise might not be able to participate.

If you are planning on camping, please contact Ron Mann 303 257-7239.

As usual, we ask everyone shooting to please volunteer in some capacity at the State Shoot. This event runs solely on volunteers, so please find some time to donate. We can always use range officers and people at registration.

Lastly, if you are not a member of the Colorado State Muzzleloading Association, please consider becoming a member for an annual fee of \$30. Our membership is under 100, and declining. If the trend continues, there will **not be** a State Shoot, a Big Bore Shoot, a Master's Shoot, a State Convention, a Poke & Stroke newsletter, or someone working with the State of Colorado on hunting and wildlife issues. We need membership

dues to fund all of these things and to pay the insurance that covers every shooter. \$30 is a small price to pay so you can be a part of keeping our State Association strong.

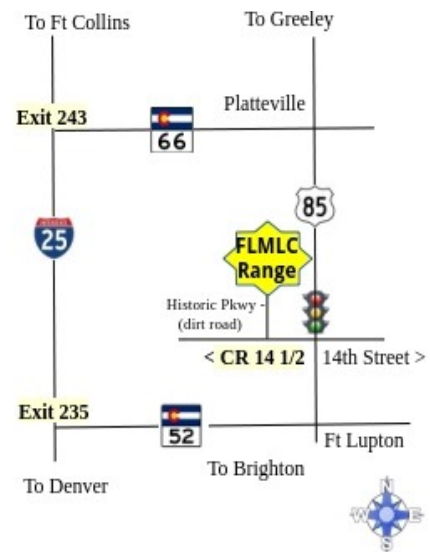
