#### **CSMLA POSTAL MATCH**

Here's a fun way to shoot and gain yourself some bragging rights for being "spot-on"! Go to https://csmla.webador.com/csmlapostal-match and download the official target. Post your target at 25 yards and put 5 holes (with your selected rifle) in it. Fill out the registration information and mail it with a check or money order for \$3 (cash is OK, if you don't mind sending it through the mail). It is OK to put you and your shooting buddies' targets all in one envelope and write just one check. More than 5 require

extra postage. Mail to: CSMLA Postal Match, 3 Balfour Ave Colorado Springs CO 80909. Only one target may be shot in a month but if you want to wait till you have a couple to mail in, that is OK, as long as you sign and date them. Get your club to make this a part of the monthly shoot. Spread the fun.

#### Wildlife Report from CSMLA Wildlife Director David McCord

Wolf issue: The RMEF and others are appealing the court decision that returned wolves to the endangered species list.

#### Legislation:

- Public school hunter education, HB22-1168, passed, authorizes local public schools to offer hunter ed for 7th graders with parent or guardian permission; is elective and must be taught by a certified hunter education instructor and satisfy CPW requirements. My thanks to Wes Mendez, CBA's Legislative Representative and his two Scout sons who testified at both the House and Senate committee meetings on this bill. In turn, Gov. Polis invited both boys to join him at the bill's signing at recent Sportsmen's Caucus and he asked the two boys to add their signatures to the bill, quite an honor for the two Scouts.
- "Cat" bill SB22-31, failed, would have prohibited trapping and hunting bobcat, lynx and mountain

lions. Efforts by the just formed CWCP coalition helped to kill this

- "Safe crossings for wildlife and motorists" SB22-151, passed, \$5 million to CDOT for wildlife-friendly highway over and underpasses, ROW fencing and related in high game collision risk locations
- Habitat Partnership Program HB22-1072, passed, reauthorizes cooperation among CPW, private land owner/managers, public land agencies and sportspersons to sustain ungulate populations. Provides resources to resolve agriculture and game conflicts.
- The legislature approved an increase in staff for CPW in the DNR's budget.

The Colorado Wildlife Conservation Project (CWCP) to monitor legislation and coordinate action is a success and will continue activities this summer and fall in preparation for legislative issues expected for 2023. CWCP representatives plan to brief select CPW members to enhance their knowledge of issues important to CWCP that will be surfacing, especially the 5-year plan and license allocations

The CPW Commission has nine members (plus two non-voting members), all are appointed by the governor. Their bios are shown on the CPW website. It troubles me that hunting as an activity is rarely listed, two list outdoor education as their emphasis, two are ranchers (probably owners), one manages a large trust property, one lists production agriculture but his home is Aspen, two are female African Americans, neither appear to hunt or fish and both live in Boulder. One member owns a guide service, is a hunter, and she is a member of the RMEF.

about Commission membership: The 11 (sic) voting members of the commission include three members who are sportspersons, one of whom must be an outfitter; three agricultural producers; three recreationalists, including one from a non-profit, non-consumptive wildlife organization; two at-large members. Members are expected to represent all parks and wildliferelated issues, regardless of their affiliation. A minimum of four commissioners must be from west of the Continental Divide.

One Commissioner's term is up this year in July and two are up in July 2023. Given that hunting and fishing license fees cover so much of the Division's income I feel we need a stronger hunter representation at their table.

(Most of us can read only the first three places on a micrometer. Be sure to round off last digit. Be careful.

Correction is for 100 yds. Double the correction for 50 yards, and multiply the correction by 4 for 25 yards.

Remember: If you want"the bullet strike point to move Right, then move the front sight Left. If you want to raise the point of impact, the lower the front sight, or raise the rear sight. Always average your groups.

My Grandma's Sugar Cookies by your editor, Mike Lee

My grandmother on my dad's side was not noted during her lifetime as a very good cook. Somehow she managed to make it to adulthood with little knowledge on the subject. This had to be a rarity for a woman coming of age late in the 19<sup>th</sup> century but, so it was. There is a story in the family of one of her first cooking "experiments" as a new bride. She made biscuits for breakfast and my grandfather, upon biting into (more like onto) a biscuit pronounced them hard as a rock

and went to the back door and threw the biscuits.....right into the eye of the neighbors cow! The cow lived out the rest of it's days with sight in only one eye.

However, as her life as a wife and mother (13 times) progressed, she became a better cook. That was surprising since my Grandfather provided her a full time cook and housekeeper for many years. Even more surprising was the fact that she learned to make the best biscuits you could imagine. And her other claim to fame was (and still is) her sugar cookies. I don't know where she got the recipe but my copy was transcribed by my mother in about 1947. So, here it is

Ingredients: Sugar, eggs, salt, vanilla, lard (yes, lard, do not substitute!!), nutmeg, sour cream or milk, flour, baking powder, baking soda.

Mix together 3-4 cups flour, 2 heaping tsp baking powder, 1 level tsp baking soda.

Cream together in a mixer ½ cup lard, 1½ cups sugar, 2 eggs, 1 tsp salt, 1 Tbsp vanilla, 2 scant tsp nutmeg.

Next, add 1 cup sour cream or sweet cream or milk to the creamed mixture folding it in gently.

Then add the flour mixture a bit at a time cutting it in thoroughly stop when your kitchen intuition tells you it's enough.

Form into balls that will make a cookie just a bit too large for a ten year old boy to fit all at once into their mouth. Bake at 350 deg for about 15 minutes. Keep an eye on them. They shouldn't be too crispy..

#### The First Raton Rendezvous

Dick told this story to his wife Joanna as she put it on the computer August 1,1993

The first Santa Fe Trail Rendezvous was held in June of 1975 at Coal Canyon on the NRA Whittington Center. Coal Canyon is 7 miles south west of Raton, New Mexico and is the primitive sight for muzzle loading events. Twenty seven thousand acres were given to the NRA for this facility to be used as a shooting range.

Hez Salsbury Jr. and I teamed up in the shooting contest that first year. Little Hez was 12 years old at that time.- I call him "Little Hez" because his father and grandfather also have the name of Hez. Big Hez was tired because of the over time he had been putting in at the CF&I. He spent most of his time sleeping and did very little shooting. It was quite funny because everyone thought we were a father and son team. I kept telling them that my kids were better looking, but I taught this kid how to shoot.

Little Hez and I won nearly every contest they had that year. Lee Robertson was the bushway that year. He lived in Salt Lake City, Utah. A "bushway" is the head duck in charge of the entire rendezvous.

This was the first rendezvous held at the NRA Whittington Center and mountain men came from all over the west. General Maxwell, the president of the NRA, came from Washington, D.C. He was the person that presented the awards at the camp fire on Saturday nite. He called me the Mark Spitz of the rendezvous.

My wife, Joanna, was there that year and she won a medal for first place in the women's event. When she accepted her medal, General Maxwell gave her a kiss on the cheek. When he presented me with another award, I asked him for a kiss too. He didn't think that was funny.

The next day I had a delegation of mountain men from Salt Lake City come to me and told me that they didn't think that it was a bit funny that I tried to kiss the General. Of course, I told them that they had been kissing up to him all week and I thought it was my turn. They didn't think that was funny either. Ever since that time some of those fellers have been trying to get even with me.

#### Who Was Thomas Fitzpatrick?

Thomas Fitzpatrick entered the fur trade in 1823 when he joined an expedition of General William Ashley up the Missouri River. Ashley was the head of the Rocky Mountain Fur Company in partnerships with Milton Sublette, Jim Bridger, Henry Fraeb and Jean Baptiste Gervais. Fitzpatrick was with Jed Smith in 1824 when South Pass was discovered. Fitzpatrick's nickname was "broken Hand" which he came by when his rifle accidentally discharged and shattered his wrist.

When the fur trade era came to an end, Fitzpatrick was sought after as a knowledgeable guide in the west. He also served as an indian agent and helped settle the Fort Laramie Treaty in 1851

Fitzpatrick died in 1854 of pneumonia.
